Rotary District 6740's RYLA 2023: Bigger Than Ever Christopher Hickey, District 6740 RYLA Chair

Rotary District 6740, with support from the Rotary Club of Lexington, will host our 7th RYLA on April 22, 2023, at the Life Adventure Center in Versailles, Kentucky. Rotary District 6740 Governor Seema Sachdeva's vision is making RYLA 2023 bigger than ever. What the District 6740 RYLA Team needs from our district Rotarian Clubs is identifying five volunteers and to sponsor students to attend. The goal is to host 44 students divided into four teams, each led by a Rotarian volunteer, we call "Wranglers." The cost to sponsor a student is \$275 which pays for the Life Adventure Center programming and administrative costs, food and refreshments, a RYLA team shirt, and the coveted RYLA coin. RYLA provides our students, who have experienced a couple years of pandemic isolation, with outdoor adventure challenges and leadership experiences, at a pivotal point in their lives, that are life changing.

RYLA's vision is to help build future leaders of our community by providing an adventure experience that bolsters strength, resilience, confidence, and self-awareness. The District 6740 RYLA program, since it's inaugural program in 2015, has enabled 269 students become better leaders. The District 6740 RYLA team has conducted program models ranging from 1 to 4 days. The one-day model achieves the RYLA vision while striking a reasonable balance of time, costs, and energy. This one-day model will open many more Rotarians to volunteer and lesson program costs, which will enable us to invite many more students and increase the program's impact. We executed RYLA 2022, after a two-year pandemic program pause, with a smaller group of 20 students but are now ready to go big. We want to identify 20 students from Lexington and 20 from the rest of the district to attend RYLA 2023.

RYLA is a full day of adventure that begins with drop off no later than 8:30 am at the Life Adventure Center, 507 Milner Road, Versailles, KY 40383, and concludes with pick up at 6:00 pm. RYLA will provide lunch and dinner. It is the responsibility of the sponsoring Rotary Club to transport the student to and from the Life Adventure Center. This is often done by the parents, but the sponsoring Rotary clubs have had volunteers transport students who didn't have a means of transportation.

RYLA begins with a discussion on leadership and being a leader. They learn that being a leader is not a position but a distinction that has to be earned through their actions. The RYLA leadership model is framed by an ethical framework called, "The Code of the West." When the students are contemplating whether they want to climb a 60-foot wall, their teammates encourage them to, "Live each day with courage."

They learn that courage conquers fear, a powerful life lesson. I love watching the students as they transition from fear, to fortifying themselves with courage as they begin the high adventure challenge, to pride when they come back to the ground. The Life Adventure Center has a policy "Challenge by choice" and students will not be forced to negotiate a challenge. The vast majority of the students are able to achieve the challenges or at least do most of them.

The student's RYLA experience is packed with adventure challenges like a 60-foot wall, which they have to climb up and rappel down, a zip line, archery, a high ropes course, and an equestrian program to learn how to work around horses. We found most of our students have never been around a horse. The day culminates with the "Amazing Race" where teams bring everything together in a two-hour, multi-event competition where they use the skills they have learned. All of this is not possible without our fantastic Rotary volunteers. Dean Hammond, a past district governor, our RYLA Director, has been leading RYLA since the beginning. Peggy Trafton, the Rotary Club of Lexington Executive Director, has led RYLA teams multiple years as well. We get as much out of RYLA as the students.

The type of student RYLA is looking for is someone who would not otherwise have an opportunity for leadership training or develop their leadership potential. We are looking for that young person who needs a boost in their confidence. We encourage the Rotary Clubs to work with your Middle School counselors to identify these students. We have pre-formatted letters that you can send to Middle School leadership and for their counselors to send to parents explaining the RYLA program. The District 6740 RYLA will serve students who meet the following criteria:

- 1. Be a middle school 8th grader
- 2. Should exhibit leadership potential that could be developed in this environment
- 3. Have little or no opportunity to otherwise develop their leadership potential
- 4. Must have a 2.5 GPA and have a good attendance and discipline record
- 5. Must reside in District 6740 and be sponsored by a Rotary Club in District 6740
- 6. Be physically and mentally able to participate in a team-oriented leadership adventure. RYLA staff is not qualified to administer medications to RYLA students

Rotary Clubs will submit the student applications to the District 6740 RYLA Chair, me, at cmhickey@lexingtondoctors.org, and payment to the Rotary Club of Lexington, 401 W. Main Street, Lexington, KY 40507. An application, meeting the above criteria, will be approved on a first come, first served basis once payment has been received.

We need a Rotarian volunteer to lead each of our four student teams, with one volunteer backup. Our Rotarian RYLA volunteers, in accordance with the Rotary Youth Protection Guide, Chapter 3: Youth Protection Procedures, will have a background check conducted. The Life Adventure Center staff of certified instructors will provide all the high adventure instruction and oversight. The role of the Rotarian volunteers, called Wranglers, are to encourage and support a team of 10 to 12 students as they navigate the challenges of RYLA. One of the principals of the Code of the West is, "When you make a promise, keep it." I make you a promise, if you volunteer for RYLA next spring, you will get that feeling of immense satisfaction that you helped shape our future leaders. We will send the RYLA application, flyers, letters to counselors and parents out to the District 6740 Rotary Clubs in mid-January. Rotary Club of Florence and Gateway Community & Technical College Honor John and Connie Salyers with Hand Up Grant Endowment Adam Curry, Rotary Club of Florence and Ignite Intern

Florence, Kentucky – December 2, 2022 – The Rotary Club of Florence (@FlorenceRotary), Kentucky held a meeting on November 21, 2022 to honor the late Rotarian and his wife, John and Connie Salyers. The club partnered with Gateway Community & Technical College to establish the Hand Up Grant, an emergency fund grant that will help financially support eligible Gateway CTC students in Northern Kentucky.

Florence Rotarian Greg Palmer began the celebration by sharing the story of John and Connie Salyers and their involvement in the Rotary Club of Florence. John Salyers was a Rotary Club member for many years, along with being District 6740 Governor and supporter of his community. Connie Salyers also served her community through her 30 years as a middle school teacher. Mr. Palmer shared how John Salyers had been appointed as a Rotary representative for the Global Polio Eradication initiative. As part of this initiative, John advocated with federal officials for funds to be allocated toward eradicating the virus and he even spent time in Africa vaccinating children against polio.

Immediate Past President of Florence Rotary Duane Froelicher laid out his goals for the club prior to his tenure in office with former President, Adam Howard. One of those goals was to create a hand up grant whereby money would be raised to help adult students with

Adam Howard, Former Rotary Club of Florence President, then shared some personal memories he had with John and Connie. He explained that the Salyers were very devoted to their faith, being involved in the Revived Ministries. Whether it be through their faith or through the Rotary Club of Florence, the Salyers were devoted to giving back and helping others. After a sizable donation of \$10,000 to the Rotary Club of Florence Foundation by the Salyers family, Mr Howard knew he and the club had to do something to memorialize the Salyers.

After a number of coincident meetings and paths crossing, the Hand Up Grant then came to fruition, with the goal of helping Gateway CTC students with a barrier in their life while pursuing their education. After a lot of deliberation on how the Club was going to hit its goal of \$50,000, a grant opportunity of \$30,000 was given to Gateway CTC that was matched with \$30,000 in federal funds that needed to be allocated. This created a \$60,000 endowment that will continue to provide Gateway CTC students with funds in emergency situations.

Dr. Figueroa (@GatewayPrez), President of Gateway Community & Technical, and Sarah Young, Community Resource Coordinator then spoke about what the Hand Up Grant means for the students of Gateway CTC. Seventy five percent of their students work a part-time or full-time job. These students work very hard every day to reach the goals they have set for themselves, and the Salyers Hand Up Grant provides a layer of financial support that will help them achieve their goals, even in times of need.

Former Police Officer Jim Wendeln Manages Parish Kitchen By Andy Furman, NKyTribune Reporter

The transition wasn't difficult at all.

At least it wasn't for Jim Wendeln.

The Covington native served as a Villa Hills police office for 39 years.

Now he's the Parish Kitchen Manager – a ministry of the Diocese of Covington – at 1561 Madison Avenue.

"Sure, I was reluctant at first," the 63-year-old Wendeln told the Northern Kentucky Tribune, after serving as guest speaker to the Covington Rotary Club this week.

Jim Wendein at Rotary Club of Covington (Photos by Andy Furman/NKyTribune) "This was a real challenge," he added, "I never did anything like this before." The Dixie Heights High School grad started with the Parish Kitchen as Kitchen Manager in February.

"I served as a volunteer for seven years prior," he said.

Call it a Labor of Love – or perhaps a gift from above; but what Jim Weldeln does, well, is truly from the heart – his heart.

"We provide lunches from 11:30-1:30 daily; to anyone who comes in," he said.

And how many meals have you served?

"In 2020, we dished out 67,009 meals," he proudly notes, "hot meals."

In 2021 47,114 meals were served and this year – through Sunday – some 43,069 have been gobbled-up.

But Jim Wendeln is far from finished – in fact, he's just started. "My goal," he says, "is to get more involved in the community. The Covington Rotary has been very helpful."

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Rotarians and friends of the Covington Rotary, Wendeln notes, prepare and deliver varying amounts of sandwiches and cases of water every week to Parish Kitchen. "We've done this for 135 weeks," says Rotarian Brenda Fauber. "This service project began in 2020 when we wanted to continue despite the COVID pandemic."

The Covington Rotary has delivered over 20,000 sandwiches and 1,450 cases of water. In fact, Beechwood High School's athletic teams have become Friends of Rotary under the leadership of Rotarian Mike Stacy – the school superintendent – and Rotarian Jeanne Berger – chair of the school board.

"The students prepare 150 sandwiches one week each month during the school year," Fauber said.

Besides the sandwiches and hot meals, Wendeln notes that the Parish Kitchen has small give-a-ways during the year.

"Items like socks, gloves and hygiene items," he said, "we'll pass these items out about once-a-month."

Speaking of the Parish Kitchen food, it's all made on the premises, according to Wendeln – except desserts and bread, which are donated.

The Kitchen has three full-time employees – and two part-timers – all paid through donations.

"The nurses from St. Elizabeth Hospital volunteer usually once-a-week, as well," Wendeln, reminds. "They'll get blood pressure, sugar levels and arrange for follow-ups and checkups for those that may need care."

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As for the daily lunchtime visitors to the Kitchen, Wendeln says most arrive alone. "We'll see some families, but more during the summer months."

Operating as the primary outreach organization of the Diocese of Covington, Catholic Charities has served those most in need in the community since 1931.

Today, Catholic Charities provides multiple programs to over 10,000 persons annually; in addition, they provide over 50,000 meals each year at Parish Kitchen, without regard to race, religion or life circumstance.

"Our mission," says Wendeln, "is to promote healing, restore hope and affirm human potential through services that empower, voices that speak for justice and partnerships that strengthen communities."

The future looks bright at Parish Kitchen – they'll be changes in the courtyard, says Wendeln.

"We'll add more gardens, a new grill and heaters in the patio area," he said.

"We'll also be looking for new murals on our walls."

That hope is found in a former policeman who serves.

His name is Jim Wendeln

The funds we raised from this project were shared between Community Christmas and A Better Community's Matthew 25:35 Project (Food Distribution). An official tree lighting ceremony was held on Saturday evening, November 26th to kick off the Holiday season. The trees will be on display until December 31st where you can take a stroll down Memory Lane or drive by the trees.

The Fleming County Rotary Club recognized one of our Rotarians, Marvin W. Suit, who is receiving a National Historic Preservation Award from the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Marvin's involvement with Rotary projects were part of his nomination, especially his preservation of Stockton Cemetery.

Mr. Suit was recognized for his efforts in the historic preservation of an abandoned church, the James Crawford home, the relocation of an early log home, restoring the Big Run Cemetery and most recently

assisting in the restoration of the Stockton Graveyard. He formed a corporation to collect funds for a monument to be placed at PFC. Franklin Sousley's grave (raising flag in Iwo Jima during WW II).

Marvin has written numerous articles on historic preservation having an article in the weekly newspaper for several years. Many of his manuscripts are from the old books in the late 1700's and 1800's in the County Clerk's Office. His latest writing is the compiling and publishing the book, James Crawford, Early Lawyer of Fleming County, Kentucky. He has an extensive photography collection of Fleming County.

He started doing walking tours from one end of Flemingsburg to the other for elementary students and has also done walking tours for the Fleming County Covered Bridge Society which can be viewed on-line, "Walking Tour Draws History Buffs Downtown,"

Pikeville Rotary completes 3rd successful Christmas Nursing Home Project Karen Prater, Club Member

Pikeville Club Treasurer Eva Stewart lost her father during the pandemic; in 2020 she wanted to honor him by obtaining gifts for the nursing home residents in the community near her residence. She brought her idea to then Club Secretary Karen Roberts Prater; and between them they decided to begin a Christmas Nursing Home Project for all 4 Pike County Nursing homes; nearly 400 residents! Within 3 weeks, Stewart and Prater had assembled a team to spearhead the project! Nearly \$12k was raised for the project and every resident at all 4 nursing home in Pike County were provided a gift bag filled with treats; which included either a warm up outfit, pajamas or a gown, socks, toiletries, and snacks. In 2020 due to the pandemic, Rotarians were not allowed inside the facilities to sing carols. However, they elected to stand outside the residents windows and other locations where residents could see them and sing carols!

Stewart and Prater continued the project for 2021. So again; they put together the committee and had another successful event! EXCEPT FOR 2021, THE PIKEVILLE ROTARIANS WERE ALLOWED INSIDE THE FACILITIES TO SING CAROLS TO THE RESIDENTS!

Again for 2022, Stewart and Prater spreadheaded the project; however, they began acquiring gifts earlier (in July!) and were able to provide even more gifts to the residents for this year. There are not in excess of 400 residents in skilled care facilities in Pike County and the Pikeville Club visits while providing gifts and singing carols at each one.

Prater indicated she feels this is the most humbling, worthwhile and rewarding service project the Pikeville Club does each year.

Stewart indicated she felt this was an honor to her father who as a Church Deacon spent many hours visiting nursing homes!


