MESSAGE FROM DISTRICT GOVERNOR SEEMA SACHDEVA

Rotary is a champion for fighting poverty and disease, promoting peace, maternal and child health and literacy, assisting access to clean water and sanitation as well as protecting our environment. These are the seven areas of focus of The Rotary Foundation. November is Rotary Foundation Month. I would like the clubs to focus on the transformational impact this Foundation has had since it was first initiated in 1917 by Arch Klumph with the initial contribution of \$26.50.

The contributions that Rotary members make to The Rotary Foundation help fund Global Grants, Peace Scholars, PolioPlus Program as well as District Grants. Last Rotary year, the Foundation raised \$430 million, and funded over 1190 Global Grants, 470 District Grants and 225 Disaster Relief Grants. Our district has a reverse Global Grant funded at \$172,000 to install septic systems in 20 homes and provide clean water hook-up to 15 homes in the remote areas of Leslie County in Appalachian Kentucky. We received a Disaster Relief Grant worth \$25,000 to assist the people of eastern Kentucky affected by the devastating floods in July 2022. Our district is a lead participant in a Global Grant, The Butterfly Project: Empowering Girls in the pastoral communities of Northern Kenya. We are contributing \$20,000 towards this project. This year our district received 19 Grant requests from our clubs to fund various projects to serve a myriad of community needs. I am happy to report that we were able to accommodate all grant requests. The clubs in our district are engaged in fulfilling the tremendous needs of their communities. Many clubs are addressing food insecurity, Empowering Girls initiative, supporting youth activities, promoting literacy, just to name a few. Not only do these projects fill the important niche, they also bring Rotary to the local forefront.



Message from District Membership Chair C. Dale Elifrits, PDG

C. Dale Elifrits, PDG Dale has been a Rotarian since being inducted into the Rotary Club of Rolla, MO in 1985. He was a DG in Missouri 1996-97 for a district that no longer exists! Missouri Rotarians re-districted themselves during the 1990s due to two of their four districts' falling membership. Elifrits was elected the Chair of the old four-district state-wide committee of 16 Rotarians to propose a new district boundary system that would give the whole area new districts of more than 1,600 members each since two of the old districts were less than or barley over 1,200 members. The three new districts went into operation in Rotary year 1999-2000. These



districts have prospered since then and have provided many leaders for our Zones and beyond!

I feel certain everyone knows that District Governor Seema has set **membership goals** for this Rotary year of an increase in overall membership in the Rotary Clubs of our district by 10% and 20% growth in women members in our Rotary Clubs.


These are achievable goals, in fact, we should exceed these goals! Here are some thoughts about how to exceed these goals:

- Re-connect with members who have not continued to be active in your Rotary Club during the COVID-19 pandemic interference with your Club's meeting schedules and service projects. These are most likely candidates for membership recovery bring them back into the folds of your Rotary Club!
- Remember the Classification List of Professions represented in your club? Examine the active professional folks in you Rotary Club's community and compare this with the current professions whose members are active in your Club. This comparison will yield a list of potential professions not represented in your Club's membership find them and bring them into your Rotary Club!
- The world lives on competition! Create "member getting" teams within your Rotary Club with the goal of increasing your Rotary Club's membership by 20%. This has worked well in many volunteer organizations and in many Rotary Clubs! Set the goal and establish a date at which the team that brings in the largest number of new members receives its award and the other team(s) receive their consolation award(s).
- Propose/usea "trial' member period offer a three-month membership plan where new members can pay for only those months to get a better feel for what it means to be part of your club. This way, they don't have to worry about investing money/time for the entire year. Alternatively, use a "pay-as-you-go" for this trial period.
- Host an open house and promote it via Facebook ads. You can set your own budget and reach a wider audience.


- List the benefits of joining your club right on your Internet site or Facebook site. Add a video showcasing the fun your members have evokinga feeling of being part of a club or team.
- Ask your guests and speakers to join your club, even if they choose to join as honorary members.
- Consider novel meeting schedules and places, company/corporate memberships, satellite clubs ...

Be creative, imagine new strategies beyond this list of suggestions and take action. Enjoy Rotary and share that enjoyment across your community with new members!



Where We Stand in Membership in District 6740

This graph, taken from https://rcc.rotary.org/#/dashboard (Club Central), represents the past five years of membership data for District 6740. These data are current as of 22 October 2022. The obvious trend, as shown by the red arrow, is profound evidence of the immediate need to grow the number of members in our District! Based upon experience with membership numbers in Clubs/Districts in Missouri, Rotary International becomes pushy about redistricting when the number of members in a district approaches 1,200! We in D-6740 are trending toward this threshold precipitously and are perilously near to it NOW! Hence the urgency of DG Seema's goal of **10% growth – 130 additional members** -- this year it is absolute and essential to be achieved.



Gender Trends in Rotary Membership in District 6740

This graph from the same source as the one above shows the distribution of members by gender in the Rotary Clubs of our District. These data are current as of 22 October 2022. The green arrow shows this trend – disappointingly similar to the overall membership trend in the graph above. DG Seema's goal for this year is to increase the percent of women in our Rotary Clubs by 20% -- 88 additional female members this year. As this graph shows, this is clearly an achievable goal. Further, by achieving this goal we will reach a significant proportion of the goal of 10% overall membership gain in District 6740 this year.

Summary:

It is abundantly obvious that we Rotarians in District 6740 have membership development work to do! Rotary International provides copious ideas and tools to help us on its various Internet sites. I suggest that each Rotary Club's membership chair (if you don't have a membership chair, then the club president) start by careful examination and consideration of the information at this site:
