Message from the District Governor

Eradicating polio isn't easy, but making history never is!

World Polio Day is just around the corner. Since the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was created:

- There has been a 99.9% reduction in cases of illness caused by wild poliovirus.
- 3 billion children have been immunized.
- 125 countries where polio was endemic have been reduced to two Afghanistan and Pakistan – with the virus contained in just a few more remote districts and provinces.

Even just one case still represents one child's life forever changed by polio. That's why Rotary members must remain tenacious and keep our promise: We won't stop until we know that no child will ever again experience the paralyzing effects of polio.

On Oct. 24, how will YOUR club recognize Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio?

Each club is urged to get involved on some level. But you should start planning NOW if you have not already identified an event. You can go to the World Polio Day Resources page on rotary.org for tips and tools your club can use to help achieve a polio-free world. You could have a special fundraiser with proceeds going to the PolioPlus Fund. Your club could host a virtual or community event. There are multiple messages already written for you to share on social media. Use the World Polio Day Webpage for inspiration. Add hashtags: #EndPolio#WorldPolioDay!

One thing is certain, every Rotarian in our district (and indeed around the world) needs to double down on their efforts to protect ALL children from this devastating disease. Polio anywhere is a threat to children everywhere.

Hello Rotarians

It gives me great pleasure to report that our District was well recognized at the Heart of America Zone 30 & 31 Institute held on September 21-24,2023, in Memphis, Tennessee.

We are proud to support The Rotary Foundation that upholds it's mission to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty.

All the 31 districts in Zone 30 and 31 were encouraged to meet 5 recognition criteria based on their giving to TRF Annual Program Fund and Polio Program.

Our District met the recognition criteria in ALL 5 categories in Zone 30 and Zone 31 and was the only District to qualify in ALL categories. For the Annual Program Fund, we qualified for:

*5 percent increase to APF giving annually

* 10 percent increase in giving to APF from January to June Cycle compared to previous year. * BEST 10-year Giving to Annual Program Fund Our Annual Program Fund Giving for 2022-23 was over \$144,000.

For the Polio Giving Recognitions: * 5 percent increase in Polio Giving Annually * 10 percent increase in Polio Giving in the January to June Cycle compared to previous year. Our Polio Giving to the Rotary Foundation was in excess of \$75,000, which is very significant. Overall, our district ranked #3 in Zone 30 in PolioPlus Cash Donations per capita. Our sincere gratitude to the Rotary Clubs of Corbin and London and their leadership for their steadfast support of polio eradication over the years.

We had no ZERO giving clubs to TRF!

Our District was picked in a drawing by Past RI President John Germ for the First Prize of \$250 for Foundation Activities.

I am very appreciative of all the club presidents and district leaders for their relentless support of our Rotary Foundation. It is because of such generous giving that the Rotary members all over the globe are able to do the much-needed service projects in our 7 Areas of Focus. I would also like to express my sincere gratitude to our District Rotary Foundation Chair, PDG Rakesh Sachdeva and our Leadership team including DG Jeanne Clark, DGE Xandy Stewart, DGN Greg Palmer, PDGs Mike Noftsger, James Glass, John Hutchings, Kathryn Hardman, Joe Caldwell, Keith Key, Jack McAllister, Dale Elifrits, and AGs Frank Dawahare, Vincenzo Fressola, Terry Pugh, Gil Fauber, David O'Meara as well as Patton Hart at all the sites for the Foundation Event in June 2023, where we raised in excess of \$60,000.



RECOGNITION OF DISTRICT PARTICIPANTS

GIRLS EMPOWERMENT

These activities increase impact with projects that empower, protect, and create equity for girls. We encourage districts and clubs to engage in projects that address the inequities of girls, that are faced in one region or culture. Our area of focus is aligned with Rotary's areas of focus and are the goals of our Action plan.

Projects are focused on:

- · Supporting access to health care and nutrition
- Ensuring access to water, sanitation, and hygiene resources
- Preventing exploitation, neglect, and physical and emotional violence
- Supplying menstrual and hygiene resources
- Providing access to basic education, skill training, and technology
- · Raising awareness of child labor and child marriage
- Offering opportunities for girls to elevate their voices and articulate their views, ideas, and opinions areas of focus.

We have many Districts that have developed activities and strategically focused on keeping the momentum alive. They have done an excellent job sharing in Rotary showcase for all to see.



District 6740 | Pikeville Rotary Club | Empowering Girls of Appalachia 2023 | DG Seema Sachdeva

This project benefited 250 ninth-grade girls of Pike County, Kentucky, and aimed to transform them into strong, independent, and self-reliant women. The girls received career and mental health counseling, and were engaged in conversations regarding internet safety, domestic violence and abuse, and sexual assault. They also participated in 19 hands-on skill stations related to healthcare and vocational services where they got the opportunity to perform CPR, start intravenous lines, learn about cybersecurity, and various vocations. 11 female professional Rotary members were paired with 15 girls by random drawing for a day of professional shadowing. Many of these girls in attendance would never have the opportunity to explore careers as they lack parents with educational degrees at home and don't have role models to emulate.

TÜRKIYE EARTHQUAKES

2023 response report

ShelterBox responded to a series of powerful earthquakes that struck southern Türkiye, near the northern border of Syria in February 2023. In partnership with Rotary in Türkiye, ShelterBox was quick to respond, providing shelter and vital household items including mattresses, stoves, and blankets to more than 12,500 people who had been left with nothing.

WORKING WITH ROTARY

Rotary in Türkiye supported the Government led response, which was coordinated through AFAD, Türkiye's Disaster and Emergency Management Authority, and supported by the Turkish Red Crescent (TRC). Rotary in Türkiye worked closely with AFAD, gaining permission to operate in some of the affected areas. Rotary's connections with AFAD, search and rescue organisations, supply chain and logistics businesses, and municipalities were critical in enabling the ShelterBox response and getting aid on the move in a dynamic and complex emergency.

Through its network of Clubs at city/municipality level, Rotary in Türkiye was very well connected to Governmental mechanisms and able to support ShelterBox in obtaining permissions to operate and be a part of the relief effort. The ability of ShelterBox to be present at distributions, to collect baseline data and to follow up with endline surveys, was only possible due to our partnership with Rotary International and the permission to operate that this gave us with local municipalities.



32-year-old Aleu lives with her husband and two children--one-year-old Beste and four-yearold Boris--in Azurs district, Türkiye.

When we first met with Aleu in March 2023, the family were sleeping in a small camping tent, not big enough to fit the four of them. Now, they are sleeping in the tent provided by ShelterBox.

"This tent is not a small [gesture]. For us, it's a huge support. It makes us feel safe."

The family have hopes to one day move to a more permanent place to call home. "We are going to buy some land and build a prefabricated home made from lighter materials, but no concrete. We do not want to go inside concrete anymore."



NEEDS ASSESSMENT

A ShelterBox team travelled to the affected regions of Adiyaman and Hatay with members of Rotary Club of Istanbul and Rotary District 2430, who were leading in Rotary's emergency response in the region, within 48 hours of the first earthquakes. During these visits, the team carried out impact assessments based on the shelter situation that already existed within the affected area.

Our teams' attention was increasingly drawn towards rural populations whose numbers had swelled due to urban displacement. Although in urban locations, there had been a move towards favouring more durable shelter options, such as containers, it became clearer that in more rural areas tented accommodation remained a viable option. This allowed families to stay at their homesites, to continue with livelihood activities, or to feel safer in smaller localised settlements as they did not have to relocate to seek shelter assistance in larger cites.





The ShelterBox team worked with Rotary and municipality staff in Arzus, leading train the trainer' sessions, which focus on sharing knowledge and best practice on tent setup. Kıvılcım Aksüt from Seyhan Rotary Club for acted as translator.



ShelterBox distributions in association with Rotary in Türkiye and local volunteers, provided aid for those affected by the earthquakes including hydrone kirk.

Following conversations with Rotary, AFAD and local Government Municipalities, the deployed team developed an assistance package with a focus on tents and household items, to allow people to stay in their homesites and not have to relocate to larger cities in search of assistance.

Following a request from the Turkish Red Crescent, an immediate 'gift in kind' was made by ShelterBox just days after the earthquakes. 528 tents were shipped on flights provided free of charge by Turkish Airlines, from our warehouse in Panama, and sent directly by AFAD for distribution in Hatay.

THE IMPACT OF OUR AID

The aim of the project, as developed in conjunction with Rotary in Türkiye, was to contribute to people's immediate safety by providing access to emergency shelter and basic household items. An emphasis was placed on our ability to remain mobile and adapt to needs as they became clear. As such, we were able to reach the additional locations of Malatya, Maras and Antep, and double the number of people supported with ShelterBox aid.

Our partnership with Rotary International and the permissions to operate that this gave us with local municipalities, allowed us the opportunity to be able to capture household data and conduct reporting activities. This was key to understanding how individuals had benefitted from our aid.

Overall, respondents expressed positive views towards the assistance package provided, with 79% agreeing that their living conditions had improved thanks to the help they received from Rotary and ShelterBox.

We also found through interviewing people who received ShelterBox support, that they felt much safer, with 67% of people saying they felt safe in their shelter, compared to 13% prior to

When interviewed before receiving ShelterBox support, 31% of people reported being able to conduct their daily routines to some extent, this increased to 68% as a result of receiving

Furthermore, 84% of people said they had more access to household privacy and improved dignity as they no longer had to stay in shared accommodation and overcrowded spaces.70% of people said they had increased protection from extreme weather conditions e.g. cold, wind

Yunus Emre, the President of Istanbul Erenköy Rotaract Club was one of many Rotaract members involved in the response; assisting with distributions and supporting the ShelterBox team as a translator during visits to affected areas.

When we spoke to Emre, he said "I want to thank ShelterBox and all its supporters. I see the impact that you have made in Türkiye - in my own country and hometown. But I see [ShelterBox's] impact everywhere, not just in Türkiye. It is very important to work together. "

"In particular, I want to thank everyone who I worked with in Türkiye. They are always working - it's like they're Superman! So, I thank you so much."

- "Ride for Rotary" is an event involving motorcycle riding and four-wheeler driving across India.
- This initiative is organized by Rotary District 3181 to support and strengthen The Rotary Foundation while celebrating Rotary Fellowship.
- The journey will encompass visits to various Rotary Clubs, insights into Rotary Projects, enjoyable fellowships, and opportunities to meet new people.
- Participants will have the chance to experience diverse cultures, cuisines, and lifestyles along the route.
- Cultural activities and a Gala Dinner will be featured throughout the journey.
- Accommodation will be provided in 3-star hotels or higher.

This message from poet Maya Angelou marked the second year this theme has been used to inspire over a hundred 10 and 11 year old girls as the Rotary Club of Lexington hosted its annual Empowering Girls Forum.

August 28 marked the event held at the Leestown Campus of Bluegrass Community and Technical College. The Forum welcomed 125 girls in the 5th grade at Arlington, Deep Springs, Cardinal Valley and Harrison Elementary Schools.

The event, partially funded by a district grant, was sponsored by Anthem Blue Cross/Blue Shield Medicaid of KY, BCTC, Community Trust Bank, Forcht Bank and the National Alliance on Mental Illness KY.

Amber Philpott, WKYT-TV news anchor, returned to emcee the event. The girls heard powerful messages on self-esteem and bullying from two outstanding community leaders. Mrs. Jana F. Wilson is a licensed professional counselor from Paducah with years of experience in treating adolescent behavioral concerns. Mrs. Roszalyn Akins is the founder and executive director of the BMW (Black Men Working) Academy as well as the Carter G. Woodson Academy, the first all-male college prep school for boys in the Commonwealth. Mrs. Akins has also been honored for her work on civil rights by President Obama and is an inductee in the Ky. Civil Rights Hall of Fame.

After the Forum, the girls were treated to pizza and games at Malibu Jacks, an entertainment venue in Lexington. The Rotary Club also had a surprise gift of twenty \$50 Target gift cards for 20 random winners.

Doing Rotary, Differently - A Week of Service

President Kim Johnson's signature initiative of breaking from our traditional formula of meeting each Thursday by eliminating one such lunch per month and substituting a week of service kicked off in August. What better way to raise awareness about Rotary, serve the community, and offer something new to engage members! Some highlights of the week:

Over thirty represented the club at the historic groundbreaking for Town Branch Park to show pride in the \$100,000 commitment to the children's Adventure Playground. More than a dozen showed up to pack 280 backpacks for food insecure students in Fayette and Floyd Counties. Some attended Commerce Lexington's Salute to Small Business wearing their Rotary pins, buttons, and attire to raise visibility while others worked in our pollinator garden getting it ready for the fall.
